According to the SDG Index and Dashboards Report 2018, Kenya ranked 119 globally with a score of 56.8.

Kenya's progress on the SDG index is currently anchored on the Big Four agenda

whose focus is: universal healthcare, food security, manufacturing, and affordable housing.

The achievement of the SDGs depends heavily on deliberate and coordinated action to be taken at the two levels of government. Further there is need to develop a framework with necessary tools and clear processes for data flow from local level to national level for further analysis and reporting.

The Kenyan SME sector plays a critical role in modern Kenyan society; constituting 98% of all businesses, creating 30% of jobs annually as well as contribute 3% of the GDP.

The SME sector provides a different paradigm in terms of monitoring and reporting achievement of the SDGs over not covered in the Big Four Agenda.

Company Turnover

46% of SME respondents posted a turnover between 0-5 Million, 15% between 6-10 Million, 23% between 11-30 Million and 16% over 30 Million.









Governance

65% of SME respondents indicated that the highest level of corporate oversight was owner manager, 23% had board of directors while 12% had advisers
